A COMMUNITY HEALTH WORKER (CHW) IS A FRONT LINE PUBLIC HEALTH WORKER WHO IS A TRUSTED MEMBER OF, AND/OR HAS AN UNUSUALLY CLOSE UNDERSTANDING OF, THE COMMUNITY SERVED.

This trusting relationship enables the worker to serve as a liaison/link/intermediary between health/social services and the community to facilitate access to services and improve the quality and cultural competence of service delivery. A Community Health Worker also builds individual and community capacity by increasing health knowledge and self-sufficiency through a range of activities such as outreach, community education, informal counseling, social support, and advocacy.

ROLE OF A CHW

- Advocate for vulnerable populations and communities
- Centralized contact person for individuals to navigate social service and health systems within the community
- Help community members get appropriate screenings
- Make appropriate referrals for health and social needs
- Track an individual's progress towards meeting health goals
- Educate individuals on health habits such as: how to prepare healthy meals, get more physically active, and stop smoking
- Cultural mediation among individuals, communities, and health and social service systems
- Providing culturally-appropriate health education and information
- Community care coordination
- Coaching & social support
- Build individual and community capacity
- Conduct individual needs assessments
- Outreach
- Participate in evaluation and research





QUALITIES OF A CHW

- Lived experience: the knowledge to navigate systems in the community because they have had the opportunity to navigate them before
- **Connected to the community:** a community member OR having a close understanding of the community that they serve with shared life experiences
- Interpersonal warmth: the ability to listen and respond to clients and communities with compassion and kindness
- **Trustworthiness & maturity:** allowing others to confide in you, maintaining confidentiality, and upholding professional ethics
- **Objectivity:** striving to work with and view clients and their circumstances without the influence of personal prejudice or bias
- Self-awareness & understanding: being able to reflect upon your own experience, biases, and prejudices to ensure that they do not negatively affect your interactions with clients and colleagues

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HIRING A COMMUNITY HEALTH WORKER

RECOMMENDED INTERVIEW QUESTIONS

- Tell us about a challenge you have faced in your current or a past position, and what you did to resolve the challenge?
- What is your experience working with individuals in need of support or assistance, particularly related to ______ (population)?
- Tell us about a time when you had to navigate through a system in the community in order to help yourself or someone else.
- In this role, you work closely with clientele with high needs. How might you set boundaries with a client who may look to you to "solve all of their problems?"

EXPERIENCE CONSIDERATIONS

CHWs live in the communities that they serve, whether they're rural, urban, or somewhere in between. There is typically a larger need for CHWs in underprivileged, marginalized communities where resources and access to quality healthcare are limited. CHWs work to help educate and improve the health of their neighbors.

Here are some job duties that CHWs may take on:

- Discuss health concerns with members of the community
- Provide informal counseling and social support
- Help people understand their health conditions
- Translate or interpret health information for clients
- Provide referrals and education materials
- Advocate for individual and community health care needs
- Collect and report data findings to help improve the quality of care and social services within a community
- Participate in evaluation and research



SUPPORTING A HUB COMMUNITY HEALTH WORKER

SUPERVISION RECOMMENDATIONS

- Schedule and hold regular meetings with CHW to review cases. Minimum of bi-weekly meetings are recommended.
- Demonstrate understanding and support for CHW need for flexibility to complete work (i.e. outside office walls or standard work hours).
- Encourage a self-care plan be developed and implemented by CHWs.
- Have a clear understanding of the role and value of a CHW (see page 5).
- CHW supervisors must participate in CHW training, as outlined by Great Rivers HUB.
