

At any one time, nearly 6.9 million people are on probation, in jail, in prison, or on parole in the United Sates. Each year, more than 600,000 individuals are released from state and federal prisons. Another 9 million cycle through local jails.


Why serve on

the inside?

Partnering with facilities—prisons, jails, mental health treatment sites, etc.creates opportunities for people on the inside, facility staff, and social service agencies on the outside.

Distribution of annual incomes for incarcerated women prior to incarceration and non-incarcerated women, ages 27-42




Figure 4. Incarcerated women are concentrated at the lowest ends of the national income distribution. The median incarcerated woman had a pre-incarceration income that is 58% that of the median non-incarcerated woman.

Learner Support and Transition students (including Jails) with completed intake paperwork








