Increasing Wisconsin's Nursing Workforce

Nursing Skills Program

In 2022, WISCAP was awarded S4.8 Million in funding from the Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation (WEDC) Workforce Innovation Grant in collaboration with the Wisconsin Department of Workforce Development (DWD) to support sustainable workforce development solutions. WISCAP's network and LeadingAge Wisconsin, a membership association for long-term care facilities, have committed to utilizing these funds to increase Wisconsin's nursing workforce through the Nursing Skills Program by providing opportunities for at least 142 low to moderate-income individuals to upskill or reskill into a high demand nursing career.

This program provides eligible Wisconsin residents with funding for tuition, transportation, childcare, and other school-related expenses. Participants receive individual support and wrap-around services from participating Community Action Agencies to ensure their success. Participants need to complete their training and be ready to enter the nursing workforce by the end of the project period - June 30, 2025.
