




Factors in Unsheltered Homelessness

- Availability of affordable housing. Wisconsin is short 123,864 available rental homes for Extremely Low-Income renters. 72% of ELI renters are severely cost burdened ("Housing Needs by State Wisconsin, National Low Income Housing Coalition)
- Rising rental rates. For example, Brown County FMRs for 2BR units increased \$233 from 2020 to 2024 (28% increase).




Increases in eviction filings





Features of Approach

- Barriers to entering shelter
- Emphasis on requiring treatment over sheltering/housing
- Increased criminalization of homelessness
- Introducing legislation in multiple states including Wisconsin (AB 689/SB 669)

Grants Pass, OR vs. Johnson

- Community just North of the border with California in Josephine County with a population of 39,194. That number represents an increase of 70% since 2020.
- Recent PIT counts about 600 people experiencing homelessness in Grants Pass. There are about 100 emergency shelter beds in Grants Pass.
- Oregon has a shortage of 102,760 rental homes affordable & available for Extremely Low-Income renters.
- Between 2018 and 2024, FMR for 2BR units increased by \$450 about a 50% increase over 6 years.
- Case involves a local ordinance making sleeping outside illegal. People experiencing homelessness report receiving tickets after 5-day notices with several having received dozens of tickets.
- A ruling in favor of Grants Pass will nullify the legal precedent set by the *Martin vs. Boise, ID* set in the 9th Circuit Court of Appeals.
- Opposition to Grants Pass is based on 8th Amendment arguments. SCOTUS decision expected within one month.
